SWEET BILL BOON TO DISABLED MEN OF MILITARY SERVICE

The recently passed Sweet bill, which was enacted into law, December 24, 1919, does not seem to be very well understood by ex-service men, and I submit the following for your consideration and publication.

The compensation is paid if the disability is total or temporary. If the disability is total or temporary, the monthly compensation shall be the percentage of compensation that would be payable for the total and temporary for example, if total temporary disability would be three-fourths of \$80; if one-half disabled, it would be one-half of \$80, or \$40 per month compensation.

The terms of the Insurance Law have also been changed as to methods of settlement. The payment for converted insurance which matures through death, as by the legal closing of the insurance contract is made optional with the insured, who may elect to have the payment made to beneficiary in one lump sum or in installments of thirty-six months or more.
