

Moberly Churches Will Observe National Loyalty Day Sunday

"Every member present or accounted for" is the slogan for national loyalty day which will be observed in Moberly churches tomorrow. The movement has been given the warm approval of President Roosevelt and is being sponsored locally by the Ministerial Alliance. "Loyalty days," today and tomorrow, are being observed throughout the country in the synagogues and churches of the nation at the call of the National Committee for Religious and Welfare Recovery. The goal of the occasion is: "Every citizen in a House of Worship every week for meditation, prayer, worship and life adjustment." Charles V. Vickrey, executive chairman of the committee, suggests: "Had the above goal been reached, or more closely approached in recent years, there probably will be no clouds over the rest of the world." He continues: "Loyalty Days are a mobilization of the spiritual forces of America to strengthen the bonds of world peace and good will as contrasted with mobilization of military forces of Europe in international strife. The more than 10,000,000 soldiers now mobilized in Europe are given no option in answering daily roll-call. Just so every church member. It has any sense of loyalty to his religious vows, when he has joined the church or was confirmed, should recognize the solemn obligation in these days of worldwide stress and peril, to acknowledge in formal church service, as well as in private worship, the fatherhood of God who made of one blood all nations of men." President Roosevelt's letter to the committee follows: "The White House, Washington. "My dear Dr. Wilson: There never has been a time in our history when there was deeper need for calling our people to faith in religion than the present moment. In the contemporary conflict between nations and their philosophies of human society, we must keep undimmed our perspective of spiritual values. "Within our own nation we are pressed by problems, both national and international, which call for divine guidance and power. As we seek continued recovery, we need more and more to realize that our search will be in vain unless we meet, with spiritual forces, the materialism which has such disastrous effect on our national and international life. "I am gratified to learn that the call is again going forth for the nation-wide observance of Loyalty Day by our churches and synagogues, September thirtieth and October first, to bring the minds and hearts of men back to consciousness of the Fatherhood of God, the brotherhood of man, and the sanctions of religion, in services of worship and rededication to these ideals. Upon them alone can the structure of our civilization rest in security and confidence. "Very sincerely yours, "Franklin D. Roosevelt."

World Communion Day Observance by The Presbyterians

'Sufficient Grace' Lloyd's Subject at Cumberland Church

"National Go-To-Church Day" is a time when every available seat should be taken," says the pastor of Cumberland Presbyterian church, the Rev. W. C. Lloyd. And he says, "All officers, teachers and friends of the church should make a special effort on this day to be present for the Sunday School and worship. The 11 o'clock worship service subject of the pastor will be "Sufficient Grace" and he says, "We are living in a scientific age. Men are searching for understanding. When we go to the philosopher he tells us to look within. There are hidden resources which all of us have not realized. We go to the psychologist he will tell us that we are using only a small part of our brain cells. Only a small part of our resources are being put into use. In the religious realm we are told by the avowed Christian to look up with hope that some day off in a heavenly realm we shall have the perfect life. Christ speaks of a sufficient life here in the present tense. In the here and now Grace is a spiritual force. It is not imaginary; it is not in a heavenly realm; it is here on the earth. It is within the reach of all. His Grace is sufficient in building character and the church that realizes such a spiritual force is a great factor in the building up of His Kingdom." The pastor will have for his 7:45 o'clock sermon topic, "Christ and the Lost." He comments, "The church should give more time to the consideration of spreading the gospel to the unsaved. Information is being saved. In giving the necessary truth to those who are seeking will bring inspiration. The church should always be busy in building the kingdom. A united effort should be manifested to show that the church is interested in the redemption of people who are seeking understanding about the question of salvation. Christ is ever ready to be lifted up through the channels of his church to save all who are lost."

Church Is First Line of Defense, Says Rev. Powell

"The first line of defense in any country where right, justice and truth are the principles of the church, against which the gates of hell cannot prevail," says the Rev. B. V. Powell, pastor of Fourth Street Methodist church, in commenting on his 10:50 o'clock sermon subject for tomorrow, "The First Line of Defense." The Rev. Mr. Powell continues: "David Livingston proved to the world that the Spirit of Christ in man is the greatest shield, sword and helmet that an individual or a nation can possess. Where the Christian brotherhood has not been broken, the Christian faith has not been shattered and the Christian Spirit has not been discarded the nation needs no other defense. "It is encouraging unto the brotherhood of Christians to read the first report of the President concerning Loyalty Day in the churches. In part, he says, 'I am gratified to learn that the call is again going forth for the nationwide observance of Loyalty Day by our churches and synagogues, September 30 and October 1, to bring the minds and hearts of men back to consciousness of the Fatherhood of God, the brotherhood of man, and the sanctions of religion, in services of worship and rededication to these ideals. Upon them alone can the structure of our civilization rest in security and confidence.' "It is up to the loyal Christians of this country to see and to make sure that our first line of defense holds. Other countries let go. Their second line of defense, war, is raging on in its destruction. Our country needs us to make strong our first line of defense now." The Holy Communion will be observed in keeping with the program of the national Loyalty Day program. The evening service sermon subject is "Having Ears and Hear Not." The Church School will observe Rally Day tomorrow with a special program, beginning at 10 o'clock. Classes will meet, however, from 9:30 to 10:00. GRAND. A generation ago a newspaperman, L. Frank Baum, sat down one day to write a story about a little Kansas girl named Dorothy who was blown away by a cyclone to the wonderful Land of Oz. Since then that story and others written by Baum and his successors have become part of many a child's life — and many a grownup's, too. A year ago M-G-M set out to prove what Fauntleroy with "Alice in Wonderland" had failed to do, that fantasy can be translated to the screen. The result is Baum's first story, "The Wizard of Oz," all over again, plus music and something with all his imagination, never dreamed of the screen's most colorful Technicolor to date. It is a big and exciting piece of entertainment that the Grand will show for four days next week starting tomorrow. Not even such starry names as the Flying Monkeys and the magic Poppy Fields, stumped M-G-M technicians, Judy Garland is Dorothy, by virtue of tricky make-up, Ray Bolger is the Scarecrow, Jack Haley is the Tin Woodman and Bert Lahr is the Cowardly Lion. Also in the cast are Frank Morgan, Charlie Burke, Margaret Hamilton, Billie Grapewin and the Singer Midgets. As you certainly ought to know, the four, Dorothy, the Scarecrow, the Tin Woodman and the Cowardly Lion, set out to find the Wizard of Oz, each for a purpose. The Cowardly Lion wants to become brave. The Woodman wants a heart. The Scarecrow wants brains. And Dorothy wants to get home to Kansas. Their greatest difficulty is the Wizard's secret — there is no such person as the Wizard of Oz. Included in the musical score are six tunes, one of which, "Over the Rainbow," has become a nationwide hit. Wednesday night, at a special "midnight" performance the Grand will present a stage attraction, "Facts of Legendry and a 'Spot Show' by Francisco the Magician. Francisco's show is the first of a new series of stage attractions. Manager H. L. Golladay has planned for the Grand, October 20 and 21 Jack Wardlow and his Rolling Rhythm Revue is to play here. The revue, including Wardlow's CBS orchestra, has a cast of eighteen. Coo Rivers, songstress, and Buddy Dunn, comedian, are featured.
